
The Chairman's Message

Valedictory Address



Tonight is a momentous occasion for everyone here, but it is especially important to the graduates, for tonight is our commencement. But what does this mean? The dictionary defines commencement as the "beginning". Therefore, on behalf of everyone present, I would like to say in closing, that I hope that each and every one of us succeeds and reaches a goal to the best of his ability, and, on behalf of all the grads, I would like to thank our parents and the staff of Bathurst Heights for preparing us for this, our COMMENCEMENT.

JUDY KRONGOLD



Papa Hair: Even though you kids have taken over everything, you still can't vote or drink.


Teeny Hair: Hic! Hic! Who shays we can't


deeply again, and this time he hurled the glass at the foot of the doorway. He apologized and promised to pay me thirty cents for another glass.

As he left, after having mooched another bottle of ginger ale and a box of pretzels, he called out "farewell" to Barbra and dragged off down the street in


his Triumph TR-3.


I not only wish you all success in the years to come, but urge you to carry on the growing traditions of Bathurst Heights.

Track and Field will be formed in the spring and we wish the girls luck in their North York competition.


Although Senior Intramural Basketball was very poorly supported, the Juniors did very well. Congratulations to the champions, whoever they may be.








Junior Football






Although the team did not win a major competition the members enjoyed participating in the various meets.
