The above four questions can best be answered to the interest of everyone by stating a few remarkable examples of the relationship and involvement with THE FOUR-WAY TEST, as applied by the Rotary Club of Toronto Armour Heights.

In November 1964, the brilliant idea was conceived by one of our distinguished members, of establishing a home for wayward boys from 16 to 19 years of age. With the generous assistance of The United Church of Canada, the plan went into action in March, 1966. A house was bought, fitted out, and an Executive Director and House Parents were appointed. Long hours of diligent work and the utmost co-operation of many dedicated people saw this wonderful idea blossom into a reality. The Home, known officially as "OPPORT-UNITY HOUSE", accommodates eight boys and has met with the unanimous approval of leading Judges and authorities throughout the Province. It IS building GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS, but, more importantly, is helping boys develop into men with a sense of responsibility and regard for others.

Once each year, The Rotary Club of Toronto Armour Heights enjoys the privilege of sending a top Student to Ottawa for a four day "ADVENTURE IN CITIZENSHIP". The Student has the opportunity of meeting the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition. A tour of the Parliament Buildings is part of this adventure, but even more interesting is the privilege of meeting 300 students from all over Canada; having lunch with them, and discussing common friendly interests with each other. The conclusion of this memorable trip is to be our Special honoured guest at our Club luncheon, when the Student relates to us an account of all that went on in the Capital City.

The yearly Oratorical contest is a matter of keen interest to our Club. Each year the top Student and the runner-up in this contest will appear at our Club Luncheon, at Yorkdale, to deliver their speech. At this time, they are also presented with splendid trophies emblematic of their worthy achievement.

1967 was an outstanding year in a project designed to promote friendships between Students on an exchange basis. Two Students and a Teacher from Sir Sandford Fleming and also from Bathurst Heights, visited Students at East Aurora, New York, and Lachute, P.Q. Four Students from each of these Cities returned the visit. They stayed with teen-agers of members of our Club. It was noted that Students and Parents alike had a most enjoyable experience!

The events recorded on this page represent only a few of the many interesting topics which are an integral part of a Rotary Club in action. It is true, that if we all make at least some effort to apply the principles of THE FOUR-WAY TEST in our daily lives, we will be the better for it.






Wrestling Team

My experience as mayor has proven this to me - the success of the student council is founded on the support of the students.



The sky is the limit!


